#### TEN TIPS TO IMPROVE YOUR GAS MILEAGE



How often do you have to stop and fill up your tank? Frequent trips to the gas station may be a sign that you're not maximizing your car's fuel efficiency. As it turns out, trading your ride in for a hybrid isn't the only way to improve your gas mileage. Here are some simple pointers to get started.

Lighten your load. Take out your golf clubs, toolbox and other heavy items when you don't need them. Any extra weight reduces your car's fuel efficiency.

Use cruise control as much as possible because driving at a constant speed increases your gas mileage. Plus, it sure makes that daily commute a little more bearable.

Switch into overdrive to decrease the engine's speed and save gas.

Keep the idling to a minimum. Instead, turn off the engine while you're waiting for your pals to pick up something from the store or finish getting ready.

Gradually accelerate to waste less gas.

Maintain your tire pressure to ensure that your tires are always properly inflated. In addition to better gas mileage, it will help your tires last longer.

Fill up with the grade of motor oil recommended by your car's manufacturer. Rising gas prices may tempt you to opt for unleaded, but that's not always a wise choice when it comes to fuel efficiency.

Give your engine a tune up on a regular basis.

Only turn on the air conditioning when you're dripping sweat and threatened by heat stroke. Okay, maybe that's a bit extreme, but you get the idea. Use it sparingly.

Take off bike or luggage racks when you aren't using them. They interfere with the aerodynamics of your vehicle and cause drag, which causes your car to expend more energy than necessary.

## LOADED POTATO POPPRS



2 lb baby Yukon Gold potatoes
1 brick (8oz) cream cheese, softened
1/4 cup sour cream
1/4 cup crumbled cooked bacon
2 scallions, thinly sliced (green part only)
1/2 cup mild shredded cheddar cheese
salt & pepper to taste
chopped fresh parsley for garnish

Preheat your oven to 375 degrees.

In a saucepan, add the potatoes and cover with water. Boil the potatoes over medium high heat until tender. Drain and allow to cool. When the potatoes are cool enough to handle, cut off a small piece of each end - this allows the potatoes to sit flat. With the ends cut off, cut the each potato in half, crosswise. Carefully scoop out the middles of each potato half with a melon baller. Save the scooped out potatoes to use later or for another recipe. After yourepeat this with all your potatoes, you should have these little potato cups that sit flat on its bottom.

In a medium bowl, combine the remaining ingredients except for the parsley for the filling. Carefully fill each potato cup with the filling. Bake the filled potato cups in the preheated oven for 10-12 minutes, or until the filling has browned nicely. Remove from oven and allow them to cool slightly before service.

Back to ZDDP, if you have an old car with a stock engine, it's not a concern. But if you have an old high performance engine with vintage style parts you should be using racing oil or diesel engine oil with higher levels of ZDDP. ## AN AMERICAN IN GERMANY:

What the Autobahn is really like By Brandon Walker

I recently experienced a wonderful trip to Germany. I arranged a car rental prior to my departure with Avis. This would be my first time driving a real German car or so I thought. When I got to the airport to rent the car, they gave me an Opal instead! This would just have to do. Can you believe this? I flew all the way from California to Germany and I only get an American car especially after Avis had promised me a VW. It turns out that Avis only said I would be in the 'VW Class' which does not mean very much. So I am stuck with the GM Opal. The Avis rental people could not get my rental GPS unit out of German after 30 minutes of attempts by at least three people. So I did not rent a GPS! I drove around the city of Hamburg just to get used to the controls on the car and the German driving environment. Then I felt ready for the autobahn.

In Germany the Autobahn system is somewhat like our Interstate Highway System in many aspects but with two key differences: One is a general lack of speed limits on much of the system. They do have electronic signs that can be illuminated to put a limit on. A common limit was 130 kilometers/hour, which is about 80 mph and 120 kph, which is about 75 mph. This limit is put on the autobahn at junctions of two autobahns generally and within some cities limits on the autobahn system. The other key difference is no traffic police. Can you imagine driving from LA to San Francisco on Interstate-highway 5 with no CHP and only limited zones with speed limits? The Germans are on to something.

I felt ready to tackle the world famous autobahn system even with the small sluggish car that I had. I immediately realized that the Opal and I had to stay in the right hand lane until the car could get up to operating speed, which took more than a few seconds. I really missed my GT500. I actually got the Opal up to 160 kph (100 mph) but this was far too slow for the left hand lane (when there was three lanes per side) as traffic came upon me so fast I could not even tell the make of some of the cars. I got the Opal up to 220 kph (about 135 mph) and that was as fast as I felt like going. I still got passed frequently!

I drove at the 200 kph rate (about 125 mph) between long stretches of the autobahn system and felt comfortable at this level.

I checked up on the accident rate between the USA and Germany and they do have a lower accident rate per capita and with the equivalent measuring system. However, the Germans have accidents with that involve many more cars than American accidents.

Generally, the only time the driver can get a speeding ticket on the autobahn is inside construction zones. They use yellow to denote a construction zone and the speed limit is imposed and is generally 60 kilometers/hour (about 37 mph) and is enforced, as this was the only place I saw the police on the autobahn. My experience was the German motorists did not cheat on this limit at all!

The secondary highways (the B highways) all had much lower speed limits on them and very strict speed enforcement with automated cameras. This would be like an American two lane blacktop road. Generally, the corporate limit of a town the speed limit drops to about 70 or 50 kph (about 43 or 30 mph) and is enforced by cameras. I know this by personal experience. I was driving into a town at dusk and did not see the corporate limit sign. However, the flash from the camera system was unmistakable as it lit me and the Opal up like a powerful spotlight would. The Germans mailed a ticket to my house within 3 1/2 weeks.





## LORI MARBURGER SANDELIN'S 1983 MUSTANG

When Lori and I were first engaged to be married, one of the most important things we needed to do was down size the number of cars (Lori had 3 and I had... a lot more) that can be accommodated by a three car garage and figure out what we wanted to have when we retire. Lori and I decided we should have the first cars (and trucks) that we had 'back in the day'. This was easy for Lori as she still had her first new car that she purchased on May 20, 1983 from Friendly Ford in Fresno California (albeit that it had been totaled by a red light runner on August 4, 1998). When I inspected the car in the early summer of 2006, I could see that it had been well maintained while being operated the first 98k miles and "fifteen years with not even a blemish". Lori's car became the 'mission' as with the frame damage and a few 'pirated' (stolen) engine and interior parts, that a donor car was needed. Now Lori's car was the first year of the 5-speed and the first performance engine for the Ford Mustang since 1973, so we wanted a candidate that we could closely match the details of her original build sheet. And, frankly, my goal was as close to a 'Vin' number switch as possible.

Not a good day...

As luck would have it, we found the exact mate (build sheets are identical) to Lori's first Mustang at the Oswalt Car Museum in South Carolina: After sending the owner pictures and a story of her first black beauty totaled-by-a-red-light-runner we were able to negotiate a purchase of the 3700 mile original for considerable less than the cost of a restoration and approximately 50% more than the original cost new. The first registered owner had the car for 3256 miles where Oswalt sold the car for a brief time to a second registered owner over a two-year period (2004-06) adding approximately 400 miles while showing the car locally and asked Oswalt to market the car yet again. We purchased the car on August 18, 2006 and the car was transported by enclosed carrier arriving in early September. This mustang was California road-ready by September 12, 2006 after having Universal Auto in Clovis rebuild that OEM Holly 4v; reworking (seals and Freon) the AC unit, and convincing the DMV that new smog equipment was not warranted for this car despite being less than 7000 miles. In addition, we were also able to get Lori's original blue personalized plate '5 0 STANG' with reduced back fees from the California DMV.

Both cars are a black on black GT with; HO 5.0 302-4V; TRX wheel & tire package with 220 x 390 Michelin; AC; fold down rear seat; Premium sound system, and; GT 5.0 stripes & emblems. Additionally the cars show build months of 04/83:


