

MIMI'S CAFÉ BREAD PUDDING AND WHISKEY SAUCE

Serves: 6

Preparation time: 20 minutes Cooking time: 40 minutes

INGREDIENTS:

Bread Pudding:

1 loaf French bread (cut into 1" cubes)
1/2 cup Raisins (soak 1/2 hour in warm water and drain)
1 pinch Nutmeg
1/4 lb. Butter (melted)
1/4 cup Sugar
2 tsp. Vanilla
1 qt. Half & Half
4 Eggs (beaten)

1/2 lb. Butter
2 cups Sugar
1/4 cup Whiskey
4 eggs (beaten in a small bowl with the whiskey)

INSTRUCTIONS:

Whiskey Sauce:

Bread Pudding:

1. Fill a 9" x 9" x 2-1/2" baking pan with the bread cubes and sprinkle the raisins on top. (Use enough bread to come to the top of the pan. You might not use the whole loaf).

2. Whisk the remaining ingredients together to make a batter, pour over the top of the bread and stir lightly. Allow the bread to soak 1/2 hour. The pan will be very full. If you have too much batter, discard the excess. If there's not enough, add a little more milk to the pan.

3. Bake in a 325° oven for about 40 minutes, until the pudding is golden brown and puffed up around the edges. The center should be "set" but still a little soft. You can

make this ahead of time and heat it in the microwave oven

Whisky Sauce:

later.

1. Melt butter in a small saucepan over low heat. Add sugar and stir well. Remove from heat, let cool slightly, then quickly whisk in the beaten eggs and whiskey.

2. Put the sauce back on the stove over low heat and whisk constantly until the sauce has thickened slightly. (If it's overcooked, the sauce will curdle). Keep the sauce warm until serving. If you like, you can serve the bread pudding with a sprinkle of powdered sugar and a scoop of your favorite ice cream. NOTE: This sauce contains egg yolks, which can carry salmonella bacteria if not fully cooked. As with other foods like beef tartar, Caesar salad, or eggs cooked "sunny side up," caution is advised when eating raw or lightly cooked eggs.

MUSTANG HISTORY: 1965 MUSTANG ON TOP OF THE EMPIRE STATE BUILDING

Back in October of 1965 a white Ford Mustang convertible sat outside on the 86th floor observation deck for all to see. How did it get there you might ask, well it was carefully placed their by Ford engineers. With the Mustang being the hottest selling car in the U.S. at the time the general manager of the Empire State building thought it would be a good idea to put the 1965 Mustang on display. When Ford officials agreed the idea was set in motion. So Ford sent out engineers to take careful measurements of the buildings doors, hallways and elevators. After determining a Mustang convertible was the car to make the trip up the elevator it was cut into four main sections along with a few extra pieces. To ensure the trip up the elevator went smooth Ford engineers did three dry runs in Dearborn before making the journey to New York.

On October 20, 1965 at the 10:30 pm the Mustang was taken apart outside on the ground level and began it's journey up the elevator. Everything went smooth except for one section which was off by a quarter-inch preventing it from fitting in the elevator. After some careful moves the section fit in the elevator and up it went to the observation deck were it was reassembled with the other sections. In just six short hours the Mustang was disassembled and reassembled on the 86th floor observation deck to be photographed from above by a helicopter.

The Mustang was then taken apart again and put inside the enclosed glass observation room. It stayed there for five months until it disassembled and removed.

Archived Press Release:

In October 1965, with the Ford Mustang the hottest-selling car in America, the general manager of the Empire State Building had a great idea – to display a Ford Mustang on the 86th floor observation deck of the iconic Manhattan landmark.

Officials at Ford agreed and dispatched a crew to take was careful measurements of the skyscraper's doors, hallways and elevators. They determined that a white convertible Mustang could be disassembled into four main sections and transported – along with many smaller pieces – up to the building's 86th floor in elevators to be reassembled.

Three dry runs performed in Dearborn to make sure it would work. Then, at 10:30 p.m. on Oct. 20, a Ford crew in crisp white overalls began taking the car apart outside the building on 33rd Street.

It all ran smoothly until the crew discovered the steering column was one-quarter-inch too tall for the elevator. Some careful maneuvering was done and by 4:30 a.m., the reassembled car was on the outdoor observation deck and ready to be photographed from a helicopter.

But that wasn't the end of the stunt. Later that morning, the car was taken apart again and moved inside the glass-enclosed observation area that is surrounded by the outdoor deck.


Many of the building's visitors were surprised and delighted to find a Mustang there and assumed it had been lifted into place by a helicopter.

Five months later, on March 16, 1966, the car was disassembled for the last time and removed from the building.

Since its debut in 1964, over nine million Mustangs have been sold but only one ever made it to the top of the Empire State Building.

BREAKIN' FREE By Sheila Boyd

In 2005 Ford Motor Company rescued 52 wild mustangs from the Rosebud Indian reservation that were on their way to destruction. Ford donated the horses to Black Hills Wild horse Sanctuary in South Dakota. I ran across this heroic story in the Canadian Driver while searching for references of wild mustangs to paint on a 1966 Ford Mustang Hood for a show I was preparing.

Intrigued by the story I began to research and seek out the heros. Much to my surprise, not many people at Ford had ever heard the tale, so I called Black Hills and spoke with Director Susan Watt.

Susan not only validated the story, but hooked me into her passion for our wild Mustangs. Her generosity and enthusiasm regarding the rescue and preservation of our American Heritage in the form of our Wild Mustangs led to my first design title Four Winds. Susan sent me references of the original 52 and from that I extracted the horses that kept appearing in the many brochures and calendars that Susan sent.

Roll the calendar forward to April 2009. I had the opportunity to do a follow-up piece for Jeff's new Mustang I call *Breakin' Free.* I once again called on Susan Watt at Black Hills Sanctuary for an update. Just as passionate about their herds as ever, she informed me that there had been some births, deaths, and some new herds formed from the original 52. One horse that caught my attention was Painted Desert, a stallion that found his way to start a new herd.

The design on the hood of Jeff's Mustang is a combined effort of many wonderful people and a tribute to all wild mustangs surviving today. Descendants of the Spanish horses Cortez brought to the new world, the Mustang has served mankind and continues inspiring humans to this day.


I could not have painted this mustang without the cooperation of a phenomenal photographer, Bob Langrish who generously allowed me to use the positioning of a photo he captured of a Hanoverian warmblood bucking. I used references from Black Hills of Painted Desert, and studied the markings of Hidalgo, the legendary Mustang who won the 3000 mile race across the Sahara Desert. Breakin' Free is a tribute to the wild horses that have influenced man for thousands of years, and has become the symbol of Freedom in America.




