
I've had trouble getting into the newsletter mindset and have put everything off until the last minute. My brain is still on vacation. I got it done with the help of some of the members.

Thanks to all of you who contributed this month. I really appreciate it. There probably wouldn't be anything but a calendar in this issue without you. "-)



OLD FASHIONED VIRGINIA PEPPERED HAM



large smoked Virginia Ham
tablespoon dry mustard
tablespoons brown sugar
tablespoon cracked black pepper
tablespoons honey
t/4 cup bread crumbs
cloves (optional)
Soak ham in a large pan with enough cold water to cover
for 24 hours in a cool place. The following morning, scrub
the ham using a new natural fiber scrub brush.

Boil the ham for 1 or 2 hours, then remove the skin (cut through the fat under the skin and pull it away from the ham).

Combine remaining ingredients (except cloves).

Cover the top of the ham with the bread crumb mixture. Make criss-cross diamond shape incisions into the ham using a sharp knife. The centers of each diamond may be studded with a whole clove, if desired.

Bake the ham at 15-18 minutes per lb. at 325°F (or 140°F internal temperature).

Note: If you prefer a sweeter ham, use more sugar or honey in the mixture.

RUMOR MILL:

FORD FALCON TO GET BLOWN 5.0 LITER COYOTE



Back before Ford announced it was producing a new aluminum block version of its supercharged 5.4liter V8 for the 2011 GT500, speculation ran rampant that the new 5.0-liter Coyote V8 would get the force-feeding treatment. At the time, Ford declined to comment, but even with the introduction of the lighter 5.4-liter, the speculation never died away.

It now appears that a supercharged 5.0-liter will first appear in Australia in 2011 powering the new Falcon XR8 and possibly a GT-HO. Ford acknowledged that the Boss 302 could have been fitted with a blower, saying in its release that "the Mustang team knew a supercharger would be the simplest way to extract significant power improvements from the new 5.0-liter V8, but they elected not to pursue forced induction for the 2012 Boss to stay true to the original Boss 302 engine."

Given that the rest of the 5.4- and 4.6-liter V8 applications in North America are disappearing in 2011, one has to wonder how long Ford will keep the current GT500 engine around. The most recent speculation is that a boosted **version of the** Coyote will arrive here in time for the 50th anniversary of the ponycar in 2014. And that can't come soon enough.

THERE'S A NEW BOSS IN TOWN! By Doug Deffebach



Every Mustang-phile has a list of favorite ponies. Topping the lists are the BOSS models sold from 1969 to 1971. The first, and likely most legendary (because it's the one that won all the road races), is the 1969-'70 BOSS 302. There also was the hemi-headed "shotgun" 429 cubic-inch monster that sold in very limited numbers those same years. And the BOSS's first run wound down with the underrated solid-lifter BOSS 351 of 1971.

The current-gen Mustang body style has cried out for the BOSS treatment since its introduction in 2005, and finally Ford has the motor and the interest to do the job. New for 2012 will be the return on the BOSS 302 with 440 horsepower and track optimized suspension tuning that will send you hunting Cameros on Blackstone.

Fords global VP of product development told the BOSS 302 product team "We ain't gonna do this unless we can beat a BMW M3's lap times around Laguna Seca" – as challenging a road course as exists in North America. Nearly every area of the Mustang's hardware and appearance has been fortified for the BOSS 302. Says Dave Pericak, Mustang chief engineer: "The Boss 302 isn't something a Mustang owner can buy all the parts for out of a catalog or that a tuner can get by adding a chip. This is a front-to-back reengineered Mustang with every system designed to make a good driver great and a great driver even better".

There will be two BOSS 302 models, the totally street able BOSS 302, and the track-optimized but still streetlegal BOSS 302 Laguna Seca. Stay tuned, and place your orders now for the BOSS sales, which will begin in the spring 2011. All Ford is saying about pricing is that it will be between the GT and GT500. The Laguna edition will be near the top of the range. The Mustang Team members and key project consultant Parnelli Jones, who set the Laguna Seca lap record in a BOSS 302 back in 1970, all hope fervently that those who end up buying the new BOSS 302 don't mothball them as collector items, but race them and WIN!


























RON and NANCY'S EXCELLENT ADVENTURE By Nancy Sharmer

That's something I had always wanted to see, and I highly recommend it. It's truly awesome.

I had made an itinerary that we stuck to pretty closely so that we could see as many stud farms as possible. We went to six farms and saw really famous stallions, and to Old Friends, a retirement/rescue farm, and to a family farm owned by the family of a woman I "met" on Facebook. We made it to five Hard Rock restaurants in different states and bought magnets for all of them. You should see our refrigerator. We took a tour at the Buffalo Trace Distillery and brought a sample home. Bourbon smells so good! Speaking of smelling good, we also went to a tiny, old chocolate factory and brought home some bourbon balls.

One day we went to the races at Keeneland, one of the most beautiful racetracks in the country. Small, but refined. The Budweiser horses paraded down the track there.

You couldn't fight your way to the paddock before Zenyatta's race as people were lined up about 15 deep waiting for her. The whole atmosphere was electric.

As usual she did her dance and prance routine and the people loved it. 




