

Shelby Expands GT350 Line

Shelby American has announced an expansion of the 2011 Shelby GT350 program to offer a naturally-aspirated version along with the availability of an automatic transmission. This means that the GT350 will be offered in both normally-aspirated and supercharged versions as part of a post-title program through select dealers across the US.

According to Shelby American, the decision to add a naturally-aspirated version was driven by consumer demand. It also fits SCAA racing rules, which typically don't allow post-title added superchargers.

As of May, new 2011 Mustang GTs were arriving at the Shelby American facility in Las Vegas for their conversion into GT350s. Naturally-aspirated versions of the GT350 should be available by late summer.

Pricing for the naturally-aspirated GT350 package is \$26,995 plus options, not including the base Mustang GT. The supercharged version has a MSRP of \$33,995, which also doesn't include the price of the base car.

TRIPLE CHOCOLATE TIRAMISU

Ingredients

- 2 3-ounce packages ladyfingers, split.
- 1/4 cup brewed espresso or strong coffee
- 1 8-ounce carton mascarpone cheese
- 1 cup whipping cream
- 1/4 cup powdered sugar
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1/3 cup chocolate liqueur
- 1 ounce white chocolate baking squares or white baking bars, grated
- 1 ounce bittersweet chocolate, grated
- Unsweetened cocoa powder
- Chopped chocolate-covered coffee beans (optional)

Directions

- 1. Line the bottom of an 8x8x2-inch baking pan with some of the ladyfingers, cutting to fit as necessary. Drizzle half of the espresso over ladyfingers; set aside.
- 2. In a medium mixing bowl, beat together the mascarpone cheese, whipping cream, powdered sugar, and vanilla with an electric mixer just until stiff peaks form. Beat in the chocolate liqueur until just combined. Spoon half of the mascarpone mixture over ladyfingers, spreading evenly. Sprinkle white chocolate and bittersweet chocolate over the mascarpone mixture. Top with another layer of ladyfingers (reserve any remaining ladyfingers for another use). Layer with remaining espresso and mascarpone cheese mixture.
- 3. Cover and chill for 6 to 24 hours. Sift cocoa powder over top of dessert. If desired, garnish with cocoa beans.
 - 4. Makes 12 squares

THE BOSS IS BACK!

Ford Mustang Boss 302 unveiled for 2012



It didn't take Ford long to come up with the first special edition of its powerful new Mustangs. It announced the Boss 302, as throwback to the original of 1968.

The Boss 302 will be a 2012 model, the first one so far unveiled by the Blue Oval. It will be priced somewhere between a Mustang GT and Mustang GT 500 when it goes on sale next spring, says Ford Vice President Jim Farley.

To show off the new Boss, Ford bused a bunch of reporters covering the Pebble Beach Concours d'Elegance and the other car events around Monterey, Calif., today over to the Mazda Laguna Seca raceway to give them an unveiling and demo. Ford Honchos Mark Fields and Jim Farley roared in and in the third Boss 302 — Parnelli Jones, who set racing records with the original car 40 years ago.

"The Boss is back," Fields said. "We developed this vehicle to live up to the original."

For power — and that's really what this is all about — a Ford team tinkered with the 412 horsepower 5-liter V-8 from the 2011 Mustang GT:

By adding more intake, revising camshafts and tuning the twin independent variable camshaft timing, Ford was about to coax out 440 horsepower and 380 lb.-ft. of torque. Yet it says the Boss offers a smooth idle and low-end torque for comfortable around-town driving.

"The decision to build a modern Boss was not entered into lightly," said Derrick Kuzak, a Ford group vice president. "The entire team at Ford felt the time was right and with the right ingredients, the world-class 2011 Mustang could support a successful, race-bred, worthy successor to the original Boss 302. For us that meant a production Mustang that could top one of the world's best – the 2010 BMW M3 – in lap times at Laguna Seca. We met our expectations."

The new Mustang has a race-inspired clutch with upgraded friction materials transmits power, and a short-throw, close-ratio six-speed manual transmission.

To set Boss apart looks-wise, each car will have either a black or white roof panel, coordinated to the color of a side stripe. The Boss will come in Competition Orange, Performance White, Kona Blue Metallic, Yellow Blaze Tri-Coat Metallic and Race Red.

Other differences, Ford says, are aimed at reducing drag: Up front, a unique fascia and grille are highlighted by the blocked-off fog lamp openings and aggressive lower splitter, a version of the design used – and proven – on the Boss 302R race car. The front splitter is designed to function at high speeds by efficiently managing the air under and around the car. It helps to reduce underbody drag and front end lift while more effectively forcing air through the Boss-specific cooling system. At the rear of the car, the spoiler was chosen to complement the front aero treatment and minimize overall drag. As if it weren't exclusive enough, Ford plans to offer some Boss 302 Laguna Seca editions. An edition of an edition, whew.

The answer to the picture shown on page 4 is "a Radiator Filter"!

Here are the instructions for making your own.

Make a radiator filter for your down draft radiators that have a tendency of plugging up the cores. Get a piece of fine wire screen and cut it to go around the upper radiator tube. Then take off the hose at the top and put the cut piece of screening around the hole in radiator. Take the end of a screw driver, or even your fingers, and punch it in till you build a pocket in the tube. Then cut it around the tube about 3/4 inches long. Put into radiator tube and then put the radiator hose on around the screen and tighten it with a clamp. Check for leaks. There should not be any leaks, but if there are you have cut the overlap to long. Take it off and try again.

Run your car for about a month, then check and clean the filter. If you find your car is over heating before this, then check the filter and I'm sure you will find that the screen is working good because it will probably be all "gooked" up with sediment that other wise would have plugged your radiator cores.

Or—you can go buy an "in-line" filter that costs about \$37.00

Heads up, pony fans; Ford has just released the details on its new graphic program for the 2011 Mustang. Just like with the pint-sized Fiesta, the company will let you slather the muscle car in any number of graphics packages to suit your tastes. The designs vary from tasteful stripes and accents to some cringetastic pieces like the "clear hood" 5.0 shown above and various tribal decals. Jersey Shore, here we come.

Ford has priced the most of the vinyl packages at \$299, though prices vary depending on how complicated the design is and how much vinyl is used in the process. Near as we can tell, the priciest of the lot are the reverse stripes that cover the majority of the top of the car in the sticky stuf. That package will set you back close to \$1,000.

You can even pick from a number of colors to suit your vehicle, including a carbon-fiber look material. Please, for the love of the ponies, stay away from that one. You can play around with the configurator yourself at the Ford site. Word has it that the next vehicle to get the vinyl treatment will be the Taurus starting next month. Stay tuned.

LIMITED PRODUCTION HURST PACE CARS

Hurst Performance is planning to build 50 limited production replicas of its 550hp supercharged 2010 Hurst/Austin Hatcher Foundation Mustang Pace Car. Distinctive with their gold racing stripes and official "Pace Car" logos on a traditional black paint scheme, the exterior incorporates the Hurst identity with metal badges and a Hurst Air-Speed rear spoiler. Other details include a Hurst leather interior with contrast topstitching, embroidered logos and Hurst-logo floor mats.

The engine generates 550hp and 542 ft. lb. of torque thanks to a Ford Racing supercharger and FR500S cat-back exhaust. A ford Racing suspension and upgraded brakes are also part of the package. The cars come with 20-inch BFGoodrich g-Force T/A tires on HRE/Hurst polished, forged aluminum wheels.

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


