The first Mustang was introduced in April 1964 as a sports car that would appeal to the young postwar "baby boom" generation. It was an instant success and a short two years later, more than one million had been built.

Since 1964, more than eight million Mustangs have been sold. To put that in perspective, one of every 20 vehicles produced by Ford Motor Company over the last 100 years has been a Mustang.

The original 1964-1/2 Mustang offered a choice of two V-8 engines, a 210 hp 289-cubic-inch V-8 or a 164-hp 260-cubic-inch V-8.

FORD MOTOR CO. WANTS TO USE THE GOOGLE PREDICTION API TO PREDICT DRIVER BEHAVIOR AND USE THAT INPUT TO MAKE CARS PERFORM BETTER

The company's goal is to use cloud-based storage and computing to collect and process information about how drivers use their vehicles. Accessing those resources over a wireless network, a vehicle could automatically change how it performs, according to Ford.

The Google Prediction API, released last year by Google Labs, is designed to give an application information about past user actions so it can better predict future behavior. The API (application programming interface) uses pattern-matching and machine learning and is designed to be simple to use. On its information page about the API, Google said it could help a website recommend products to regular visitors, detect what a user would consider spam e-mail, and predict how much a user would be likely to spend on a given day.

Ford is extending this technology from the Web to the road. On Tuesday at the Google I/O conference in San Francisco, Ford will present one conceptual case for the use of this technology in a plug-in hybrid electric vehicle. If the owner started the car on a weekday morning, the car could use its recent driving history to predict that this will be a trip to the office. An automated voice would ask the driver to confirm this, and if the driver said, "Yes," the car could prepare to handle the route to the office intelligently.

In the example presented at Google I/O, the hybrid could favor its gasoline engine on the first part of the trip to set aside battery power for an electric-only section of road that it knew was coming up later on the route. But knowledge about location, routes and driver behavior could also help a car in other ways, according to Ryan McGee, a technical expert at Ford. For example, the vehicle could shift to full electric power while close to the driver's home, in order to reduce noise and pollution. A car with access to the predictive tool could also use different techniques to save energy for later, depending on an individual's style of driving, McGee said.

A large amount of information about a driver's preferences and driving behavior could be stored in a profile in the cloud and then accessed when that driver got in the car, according to Ford. The company emphasized that drivers would have to opt in to such a service so none of this data would be collected unless they agreed to it. The profile would also be encrypted to protect the information from unauthorized use.

Ford doesn't expect smarter cars to start changing drivers' behavior by throttling back their acceleration or limiting their speed to save energy, McGee said. Rather, the idea is to help the car program itself to adapt to each driver's style.

The company won't discuss any plans for car features or services based on this technology, and due to logistical issues, its software demonstration at Google I/O doesn't even use an actual vehicle. But McGee said products based on this type of intelligence might reach the market some time after 2015.

TORTELLINI STIR-FRY

Start to Finish: 20 minutes



Ingredients

- 1 9-oz. pkg. refrigerated cheese-filled tortellini
- 1 16-oz. pkg. fresh cut or frozen stir-fry vegetables (such as broccoli, pea pods, carrots, and celery)
- 1 Tbsp. cooking oil
- 3/4 cup peanut stir-fry sauce
- 1/4 cup chopped dry-roasted cashews

Directions

- ${\bf 1.}$ Cook tortellini according to package directions. Drain and set aside.
- 2. In wok or large skillet stir-fry vegetables in hot oil over medium-high heat for 3 to 5 minutes (7 to 8 minutes for frozen vegetables) or until crisp-tender. Add pasta and stir-fry sauce; toss gently to coat. Heat through. Sprinkle with cashews; serve immediately. Makes 4 servings.
- 3. Test Kitchen Tip: Vary this recipe every time by choosing a different vegetable blend and different sauce.

The naming of the Mustang was greatly debated during the vehicle's design. In its early stages, the vehicle was known as the Special Falcon. Later names included Cougar, Torino (the Italian name for the city of Turin), Bronco and T-Bird II. It was decided that the all-American name of Mustang fit the new model prfectly.

The first Mustang to appear in a movie was a white convertible in the 1964 James Bond thriller, "Goldfinger".


EASTER IN THE PARK KERMAN, APRIL 16, 2011



MUSTANG MAKES "BIG STATEMENT" WITH POWER and MPG

The numbers are in, and they've been certified by the feds, so it's official: The 2011 Mustang V-6 puts down 305 horsepower and gets 31 mpg on the highway.

The Environmental Protection Agency completed testing the V-6 Mustang this week, and Ford said Thursday it's the first time a production car has made more than 300 horsepower while returning more than 30 mpg.

We couldn't come up with a car to refute that claim — if you can, let us know — but even if Ford's blowing smoke, it's still an impressive accomplishment. It one-ups the Chevrolet Camaro, suggesting we're on the cusp of a new kind of muscle-car war, and it highlights the gains yet to be made in internal combustion engines even as the industry flirts with hybrids and EVs.

"This is a milestone for Ford and for the auto industry," said Ron Cogan, editor of Green Car Journal. "This is a big statement."

It's nothing for a hybrid like the 2010 Toyota Prius to hit 50 mpg or more, and even a rolling bank vault like the Cadillac Escalade Hybrid can get 22 combined. But we're talking about a muscle car that can smoke the tires *and* get Honda Civic-like fuel economy on the highway.

"When you've got a mainstream car like the Mustang that can give you 31 mpg and the performance car enthusiasts expect, it's just short of amazing," Cogan said.

FORD WANTS YOUR NEXT CAR TO MONITOR YOUR VITAL SIGNS AS YOU DRIVE

Dashboard Allergy Detection App Ford is working on a suite of car-based apps that can help drivers monitor their health. Ford Motor Co.

Within the next couple years, your car will notice if you have low blood sugar and tell you to have a snack; check local pollen counts and roll up your windows to prevent an allergy attack; and at lunch time, give you directions to the nearest healthy-eating establishment, pausing your iPod to broadcast the restaurant's menu.

Using a suite of new apps Ford announced Wednesday, personalized medicine could soon be as simple as revving your engines. Now we just need someone to record some lines as <u>KITT</u>.

Ford is working with three medical technology firms to build web-connected apps for its Sync onboard communications interface. The programs are still in the research stages and won't make it to market for at least a year or two. In the meantime, the automaker wants to highlight its increasing focus on consumers' health, according to Paul Mascarenas, Ford's chief technology officer.

"People are spending so much time behind the wheel, and that's expected to increase as we go forward, with increased traffic density and congestion," he said. "(This is) about seeing the car as more than just a car. It's now a platform that we can use for development, innovation, and connectivity."

Ford executives said they are not planning to have car apps that monitor blood alcohol, however, which seems like an obvious health and safety solution, especially when the company pointed to prevention of crashes involving hypoglycemic patients. The focus is on chronic disease monitoring and general wellness, Ford says.

Other automakers have been working on technology that enables cars to <u>detect pedestrians</u> and work together in teams for increased safety and fuel economy. Another notable health initiative came from Nissan last year, which plans to offer cabin air purifiers and spritz motorists with vitamin C.

Ford's concept turns cars into tools, redefining them as personal assistants and life coaches the way smartphone apps have transformed cell phones.

Ford is not targeting a specific consumer market for the technology, Mascarenas said — it could benefit anyone from frugal Fiesta drivers to owners of pricey Lincolns.

A driver would use simple voice commands to control Ford's Sync system, which the company says would keep drivers' eyes on the road. Transportation Secretary Ray LaHood has been on a crusade against <u>driving distractions</u>, especially text messaging and other mobile phone use. (The U.S. Department of Transportation considers cognitive distractions a hazard as well.)

Ford showed off some prototypes at a press briefing Wednesday. Press a button, say the word "allergy," and the Sync allergy app advises you about environmental irritants in your zip code, which can cause allergic reactions and asthma attacks. The system uses the car's GPS system, local weather info and pollen data. In Dearborn, Mich., on a drizzly Wednesday, birch and maple pollen was the predominant problem.

The system could conceivably be programmed to protect you from allergens by rolling up the windows for you, or recirculating the interior air, Ford says.

"In Los Angeles, maybe it can route you around smog buildup. It knows where you are and it knows the air conditions in that area, so it gives you a new route, not one that is concerned with fuel economy, but that is concerned with your well-being," said Gary Strumolo, global manager of Interiors, Infotainment, Health & Wellness Research at Ford Research and Innovation.

Another app, developed with the health monitoring company Medtronic, would connect to wireless-enabled glucose monitors used by diabetics. The driver would use voice commands to access his or her blood sugar records, which are stored in the cloud, and the car could ask questions to ensure that the driver's blood sugar is not too low — such as, "did you eat breakfast yet today?" If the data suggests the driver is at risk of losing concentration or fainting due to low blood sugar, the car would recommend a snack, explained Dave Melcher, a Ford research engineer. The system is meant to help diabetics monitor their illness, but also to prevent accidents.

If in-car technology can already detect someone's blood sugar, it's not a giant leap to sensors that can detect other biometric data — like blood alcohol. Cars that read a driver's blood alcohol content before starting the ignition, and thereby preventing drunk drivers, would provide an obvious public safety benefit. But Ford is not headed down that road, at least not right now, Mascarenas said.

"We have to do more research in that area ... the focus is on health and wellness," he demurred.

He and other execs who spoke Wednesday emphasized that the apps are intended to be proactive and provide positive reinforcement, not punitive measures. Other apps could help drivers quit smoking, find healthier eating options or even de-stress by monitoring their heart rates.

WellDoc, a company that offers personal health data tracking via mobile apps, has initiated clinical trials in which diabetic patients show marked improvement simply through this sort of additional monitoring. Putting that interface in a car, everyone's private, captive sanctuary, could be another way to keep patients connected, said Anand Iyer, the company's president and chief operating officer.

It's odd at first to hear automotive engineers use terms like "health outcomes" and to hear medical gadget programmers talk about cars as "mobile devices." But that's a great thing about technology — it can lead to strange bedfellows that produce useful offspring.

ACCOUNTING CHANGE MAY HAND FORD \$13B IN ADDED PROFIT FOR 2011

Ford had a breakout year in 2010, reporting an annual profit of \$6.6 billion dollars, making it the second most profitable automaker in the world for the year.

But thanks to an expected accounting move that may occur in 2011, Ford may double that figure in a single move thanks to an accounting principal related to long-term profits and losses, according to The Detroit Free Press. More specifically, if Ford continues to deliver sustained profitability for the first half of 2010, the automaker may eliminate a valuation allowance from its balance sheet that it has held against deferred tax assets.

The move indicates a positive direction for the automaker as removal of a valuation allowance held against deferred tax would only take place if a company is confident that it is going to be capable of profitability on a sustained basis. Speaking with Freep, Robert Willens, president of Robert Willens of New York, a corporate tax specialist firm, said that the total change to the income figure could range anywhere from \$10 to \$13 billion.

"This is a very positive statement from Ford," said Willens. "If you take the radical step of eliminating your valuation allowance, then you've developed a high degree of confidence in your future profit-making ability." In February Ford filed its 10-K paperwork with the federal government, revealing a valuation allowance of \$15.7 billion, one of the top five highest figures in the U.S. Now, as Ford continues to deliver profitability with each successive quarter, the automaker will be forced with removing that figure from its books.

Ford spokesman John Stoll addressed the changes, saying, "We have had a sustained period of profitability in our operations and if that continues, we would remove our valuation allowance. We've said we plan to deliver continued improvement this year in our pretax operating profit."

The accounting change will be listed as a "special item for the quarter," which will keep the automaker from facing an abnormally high tax rate. Ford accrued \$31.4 billion in sustained operating losses between 2005 and 2009, and as a result the automaker will not pay federal taxes until its profits match and surpass that amount, something that is expected to take several years.



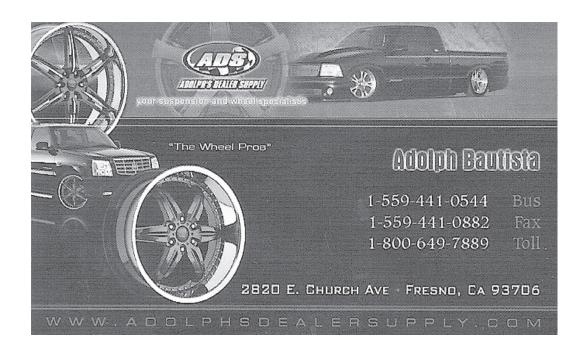
