

The automobile is not designed to fly. Sure, it might seem like an obvious statement but Hollywood stunt drivers, rednecks on YouTube and various high flying motorsports have all done their best at times to convince us otherwise.

This weekend we're disregarding the obvious shortcomings of an automobile when it comes to taking flight. We want to know what you think is the optimum automotive choice for leaving the ground. It doesn't have to be scientific or even rational, but based on your viewing of other people launching cars in the air or perhaps even personal experience, what car (or truck) do you believe is best suited for flight?





2015 Ford Mustang will feature all-new performance enhancement

There has been much speculation about the next-generation Ford Mustang, and what type of suspension it will have. According to Car and Driver, a 2015 Ford Mustang prototype was spotted and it wasn't much to look at on the outside, but underneath, the test mule revealed a noticeable change to the rear suspension. The solid rear axle was gone and a new independent suspension with aluminum control arms was clearly evident.

What this means for the 2015 Ford Mustang, is that we can say goodbye to the old pony car of the past, and usher in the new global design that has been long overdue. In a recent article here on the 2015 Ford Mustang, we have talked about the new exterior global design that will likely look like the Ford Evos Concept car. It looks like Ford will not only address the much needed exterior design changes, but will also revamp the antiquated suspension on the Ford Mustang.

Why change the suspension? The current Ford Mustang uses a solid rear axle which is fine for going fast in a straight line down a drag strip. But the new 2015 Ford Mustang is going to be sold around the world and will need to appeal to a whole new buyer. Not only will it get new exterior styling, but the new global car will weigh less, and the new more responsive independent rear axle set-up will improve the driving dynamics and also appeal to the European buyer who is used to driving fast through the curves. Independent suspensions offers better ride quality and handling characteristics, due to lower unsprung weight and the ability of each wheel to address the road independently of the other wheel.

The next-generation Mustang will finally embrace its future as a legitimate global sports car. Even though Ford initially tested the current 2013 Ford Mustang with an independent rear suspension, they ultimately decided to stay with the straight axle because of cost. Independent suspensions require additional engineering effort and expense in development versus a straight axle arrangement. As a result, a very complex IRS system can result in higher manufacturing costs.

The 2015 Ford Mustang will be new underneath Look for Ford to redesign the 2015 Mustang inside and out for the 50th anniversary of the car. Included in the overhaul is styling inspired by the Evos Concept. Also set to help revolutionize the 2015 Mustang will likely be a direct-injected EcoBoost turbocharged 2.0-liter four-cylinder engine. The new engine will allow the 2015 Ford Mustang to offer outstanding performance and be fuel-efficient.

While many of the Ford Mustang faithful will protest the extreme changes coming, Ford will have to make the changes to keep up with the competition. The Chevrolet Camaro isn't the only game in town. There are also cars like the Hyundai Genesis Coupe, 2013 Subaru BRZ, and 2013 Scion FR-S to worry about.

Look for Ford to introduce the new-generation 2015 Ford Mustang sometime in 2014, to coincide with the 50th anniversary on April 17, 2014.



Simonian Farms goes back in time with barn project

Simonian Farms in southeast Fresno is more than a century old. On Saturday, it begins a new chapter when it opens Simonian Farms Old Town.

The Western-themed town -- inside a newly built red barn -- feels like a fusion of Casa de Fruta on the Pacheco Pass Highway, local cheese operation Bravo Farms in Traver and a day at Disneyland, said third-generation farmer Bonnie Simonian.

"We would always stop at Casa de Fruta and dream," Bonnie Simonian said. "This barn was sort of that dream -- 40 years in the making."

Seven months ago, Dennis and Bonnie Simonian decided to turn a 5,000- square-foot parking lot next to their already booming fruit stand into a big red barn.

"I thought I wanted to fill the barn with antiques and make an ag museum, but then my grandson said put in a shooting range," Bonnie Simonian said. "After he gave us the idea, I thought why don't we build a model town. We have enough antiques to decorate it with."

Simonian Farms began in 1901 when Bagdasar Simonian immigrated to the region from Armenia. Today, his descendants farm about 80 acres and produce more than 180 crops that are sold at the family-run fruit stand.

The family started seriously considering the project a year ago.

"My mom and I had a vision in our minds, and it finally came to life," said Ashley Simonian, one of the couple's three daughters. "I am a farmer's daughter and I love it."

Lining the streets of the "old town" is a church, a barber shop, a Route 66 shooting range, a school house, a fruit stand, a saloon and a 1950s-era gas station.

"We hope to tell the history of the Fresno area from the 1850s to the 1960s," Bonnie Simonian said. "When locals and tourists stop by, we want them to come into the barn and then come to the fruit stand."

The lime-green door to the school house was on Dennis Simonian's grandmother's farmhouse. The window in the steeple of the church is a stained-glass piece from the original Armenian Church in Fresno.

From the anvil in the livery stable that was first used by Dennis Simonian's great grandfather to Bonnie Simonian's first car at the '50s diner, about 95% of the antiques in the barn are rooted in Valley history.

But the barn offers more than history.

More than 50 different California wines can be sampled at the Old Town Saloon and more than 80 flavors of bottled soda and loads of candy from the 1950s will be sold at the Farmers Daughters General Store.

"People are going to walk in the general store and are going to be taken back to their childhoods," Bonnie Simonian said.

But the gem that both children and kids at heart will enjoy, Bonnie Simonian said, is the animated Route 66 shooting range. Ron and John Daniels, of Daniels Woodland in Paso Robles, designed the fully animated shooting range and all of the store-front facades.

When a target is hit, the corresponding animal or car speaks, sings or dances.

"Right now we want to enjoy what we have." Bonnie Simonian said. "For us, this is the Super Bowl and our grand finale."

The grand opening of Simonian Farms Old Town is Saturday. Local wineries and other Valley vendors will offer samples and wine tasting throughout the day.



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
