Mustang made its debut with an affordable price tag of \$2,320.96, about half as much as the Chevrolet Corvette.

The original Mustang offered limited-slip differential to help improve traction on slippery surfaces.

The original Mustang offered power steering as a option for approximately \$80.

The Mustang was offered in six grabber colors: Grabber Green Metallic, Grabber Blue, Grabber Orange, Grabber Green, Grabber Yellow and Grabber Lime.

Mustangs finished first and second in class in the 1964 Tour de France international rally.

The first Mustang in a motion picture was a white convertible in "Goldfinger."

The millionth Mustang rolled off the Dearborn, Michigan, assembly plant line in 1966.

In 1970, Mustang Convertible sales shrank by nearly half because of the popularity of air conditioning.

The Mustang Convertible was discontinued in 1973, only to return in 1983.

In 1974 the first 105-horsepower 2.8-liter V-6 engine was used in Mustang II.

Mustang II was named Motor Trend's Car of the Year in 1974.

The center high-mounted stop lamp is the best way to tell the difference between a 1985 and 1986 Mustang.

The only difference between the 1997 and 1998 Mustang is the digital clock mounted on the 1998 instrument panel.


Clovis Farmer's Market

Ford Mustang becomes a Thunderbird

The Ford Thunderbird is back.

But they're just making one.

The automaker today unveiled a custom Mustang GT to celebrate the 60th anniversary of the U.S. Air Force Thunderbirds precision flying team.



The coupe carries VIN 0001 as the first 2014 Mustang off the line, and features a glass roof and red, white and blue paint scheme festooned with insignia inspired from the Thunderbird's F-16 Falcon fighter jets.

A unique wide body kit with appropriately large wing by TS Designs, enormous 22-inch Forgiato wheels and puddle lamps that project a beam in the shape of an airplane round out the exterior modifications.

Recaro seats and a Ford Racing package including a supercharger for the 5.0-liter V8, suspension and Brembo brakes bring the performance of the two-seat 'Stang closer to Air Force spec.

The car will be auctioned off at the annual EAA AirVenture Oshkosh air show on August 1st with all proceeds going toward the EAA Young Eagles organization, which provides free first flights in small aircraft to children interested in aviation.

The Thunderbirds Mustang is the latest in a series Ford has built to support the program, with previous cars inspired by a variety of historic aircraft including SR-71 Blackbird and "Red Tails" P-51 Mustangs flown by the Tuskegee Airmen.

World's First Aftermarket Cleveland Blocks Now Available

It's been a long time coming, but now the Cleveland fans have a hardy aftermarket block that's strong enough to survive anything you can throw at it. The "Titus," as it's known is produced by McKeown Motorsport Engineering (MME) and it's claimed to be the first of its kind. The new block accepts all of the standard Cleveland accessories and hardware, and what's even better, they're available in cast iron or aluminum construction and come in deck heights of 9.2in or 9.5in with bore sizes ranging from 4.00in to 4.20in

Unlike the original Cleveland block, the lubrication system has been redesigned for priority oiling to the main bearings with the ability to adjust oil flow elsewhere. In addition, the main webs are





burly, providing the greatest amount of material for 4.38in bore centers. Even the main caps have a wider span than the originals, using splayed outer bolts that take anchor in the solid pan rails. The Titus also uses a one-piece main seal that accommodates both production and aftermarket crankshafts and the cam tunnel has been configured to allow stock or larger base-circle camshafts and stock or larger cam journals.


For those purpose-built applications the option list includes solid water jackets; deck heights from 9.100 to 9.700in, 14- or 18-bolt cylinder heads; bushed lifter bores and more.

For the Next Mustang, Ford Looks to the Past

There is not a shred of doubt that suggests Ford's (NYSE:F) Mustang is not — and has not — been an incredibly beloved and successful car since its debut in the 1960s. The big engine in front, low-slung body lines, long hood, and the short deck formula has worked marvelously well for the car and others like it. But what if the Mustang was originally intended to be nearly the polar opposite of what it became?



That's a question Ford has been grappling with as the Mustang nears its 50th birthday. The company took some time to reflect on the original Mustang concept car that made its debut in 1962, a couple of years before the launch of the Mustang we all know and love. The first Mustang concept more closely resembled the Ford GT, with a wedge-inspired design and small V4 engine that was nestled behind the seats to power the rear wheels.

While the V4 only produced around 110 horsepower — it was originally intended for the Cardinal economy car — it was responsible for moving a car that weighed a mere 1,544 pounds. Moreover, the engine had to be small enough to fit in its unusual position behind the cockpit.

Now, Ford is asking Mustang enthusiasts if aspects of the original Mustang concept should be incorporated into future Mustang models. While nearly every generation of Mustang since 1964 has used the traditional muscle car layout to some degree, the inclusion and styling cues of the concept would dramatically diverge from what the Mustang has become.

In a way, altering the formula for the current Mustang to more closely resemble the original concept can be seen as taking the model back to its roots. However, Ford faces a slight dilemma if it veers too far when incorporating the concept into today's iteration: the original was more suited to compete with the Chevrolet (NYSE:GM) Corvette, which had been road-going since the 1950s. Given that Ford still does not have a direct contender, is it possible that the company is seeking to bridge that gap?

Ford to Make Up for Death of Falcon with RHD 2016 Mustang for Australia

After Ford delivered a massive blow to fans of the brand and the automotive industry in general in Australia with its decision to kill its local manufacturing operations on October 16, 2016 and end production of the rear-wheel drive Falcon, the Blue Oval thinks it can somewhat make up for it with the release of the next generation Mustang.

According to a News Corp. Australia report this weekend, Ford's global vice president of sales and marketing, Jim Farley, will fly to the land Down Under on August 13 to



make an official announcement on the return of the Mustang nameplate in the same year that the Falcon will be axed.

Ford had imported the American Mustang in Australia as a right-hand drive car in the late 1960s and had also converted a small number of cars between 2001 and 2003 to compete with the Holden Monaro, but with a price of around AU\$90,000, it only sold fewer than 400 cars.

The news report states that the right-hand driver (RHD) version of the 2015 Mustang, which itself will be revealed next year to coincide with the nameplate's 50th anniversary, will cost much less starting close to AU\$50,000. In the U.S., the current Mustang starts at \$US22,200 (AU\$24,500) for the 305HP V6, and US\$29,625 (AU\$32,700) for the 420HP GT V8.

Unlike the UK that will also get a turbocharged four-cylinder engine, Australia is likely to get V6 and V8 models. Right hand drive Mustangs are said to account for less than 10 percent of global sales with the UK and Australia to be the biggest markets.

On a final note, the report says that the arrival of the Ford Mustang in the country may convince the organizers of Australia's famed V8 Supercar racing series to change the rules and accept coupe models.

First 1,000 next-gen Mustangs to be limited edition 2014 1/2 models

Back in November a Ford social media representative on TheMustangSource.com forums posted that Ford would produce a limited number of 2014 $\frac{1}{2}$ Mustangs to celebrate the car's 50th anniversary. "The 2014 $\frac{1}{2}$ will be the 50th Anniversary edition," the representative stated. "It will be added to production for a limited run sometime during the year." She later retracted the statement, saying, "Okay, we made a mistake. We misunderstood the information and we're sorry for causing all this confusion."

However, according to our inside sources at Ford, we can now confirm that a $2014\frac{1}{2}$ Mustang is still in the works. Ford will build just 1,000 examples of the limited edition 2014 $\frac{1}{2}$ model, which will be the first Mustang to be based on the next generation S550 platform.

As the cars are sure to be instant collectors' items (we fully expect the dreaded "market adjustment" prices from dealers), each one will come with a special VIN and build number. Those hoping for a high performance anniversary model will be disappointed, as the 2014 $\frac{1}{2}$ Mustang won't receive

any additional upgrades compared to the standard 2015 model. Rumors suggest the 5.0L V8 will produce around 450 horsepower. Other differences compared to the 2015 model are unknown at this point.



Other recent Ford Mustang anniversary models:

• 2009 45th Anniversary Ford Mustang

There wasn't anything too special about this Mustang. Ford actually designated all standard Mustangs (no Bullitt, GT500, etc) models as anniversary models as production was cut short in preparation for the redesigned 2010 model year. The 2009 Mustang can be distinguished by a 45th anniversary badge on the front fenders.

2004 40th Anniversary Ford Mustang

Built in both GT and V6 versions, the 40th anniversary Mustang came in Black, Oxford White or Crimson Red and featured Arizona Beige stripes, premium wheels, body-color fold-in mirrors, an interior upgrade package and 40th anniversary floor mats. It was an \$895 upgrade option, with 5,700 being produced.

• 1999 35th Anniversary Ford Mustang

The Ford Mustang arrived in 1999 with a new design, and less than 5,000 were limited edition anniversary models. Available only for the GT model, the special Mustangs came in White, Silver, Black and Performance Red and featured a hood scoop, a black hood stripe, side scoops, a raised rear spoiler and a honeycomb insert in the rear decklid.
