Recipe for September

Breaded Parmesan Ranch Chicken



Original recipe makes 8 servingsChange Servings

Ingredients:

- · 3/4 cup crushed corn flakes
- · 3/4 cup grated Parmesan cheese
- 1 (1 ounce) envelope ranch salad dressing mix
- · 8 (4 ounce) skinless, boneless chicken breast halves
- 1/2 cup butter, melted

Directions:

Preheat oven to 350 degrees F (175 degrees C). Grease a 9x13-inch baking dish.

Combine corn flakes, Parmesan cheese, and ranch dressing mix in a bowl. Dip chicken in melted butter; roll each chicken breast in corn flake mixture until evenly coated. Place coated chicken in the prepared baking dish.

Bake in the preheated oven until chicken is no longer pink in the center and the juices run clear, about 45 minutes. An instant-read thermometer inserted into the center should read at least 165 degrees F (74 degrees C).


Out & About: Chubby's

Is This What The 2015 Ford Mustang Will Look Like?


While we don't know exactly how the 2015 Ford Mustang will look like we did with the 2014 Corvette, we have a pretty good idea thanks to the plethora of renders that have spread across the Internet. And this 3D model of the car may be the best one yet. P

This video, which showed up on Mustangs Daily this morning, features a 3D walkaround render pieced together from a litany of spy shots. While it's lacking on some finer details, Mustangs Daily seems to think this is probably pretty close to the real deal, especially since its creator has been right before. P

While some of the exterior details are still unknown, this is likely the most accurate rendering of the next-generation Mustang anyone has created so far. And we can vouch for Charles' accuracy. He used spy shots and JPG versions of three CAD files to render the 2005 Mustang before its debut, and he completely was spot-on. He even had it rapid-prototyped into a 3D model of the car.

If this is in fact what the next 'Stang will look like, then we're in for a treat. I think the new car looks bold and muscular, and it properly evolves the Mustang beyond the "retro" design it's had since the mid-2000s while staying true to its heritage.

I'm sure we'll see the real deal in a few months, if not sooner.





FLASHBACK

That Time They Put A 1966 Mustang On The Empire State Building



In the fall of 1965 Ford merchandising managers wanted to pull off a headline-grabbing spectacle.

Mustang will celebrate its 50th anniversary next spring, and Ford is planning plenty to celebrate. I've already met with Ford executives in order to be primed for their work, much of which will draw on the considerable history of the car.

Here's a part of it you may not know: In 1966 the guys running the Empire State Building wanted to generate some hype, so they contacted marketers at Ford and worked out a deal to position a brand-new Mustang on the rooftop of the building's 86th floor.

It was a canny move on their part—the 'Stang had debuted in 1964-and-a-half to much acclaim, selling more than 400,000 units (well over the 100,000 projected in the original business plan) to become the fastest-selling new car of all time. In the first 18 months of existence it sold more than 1 million cars.

The project came with some challenges, as you might expect. Namely the fact that the curve of the roof prohibited a helicopter from landing safely, which meant engineers had to dismantle the car, push it up through the elevator and then reassemble it on top. So the company sent a crew to New York to take measurements of the stairwell and elevators before returning to Detroit to figure it all out.

They had to fit the 15-foot white convertible into seven-foot tall elevators, so they cut the body into four main sections: windshield, front end, center body and rear. Then they removed the front seats, center console, doors, engine, transmission and drive shaft. They also cut out the floor pan and the base of the windshield frame before fitting a series of sliding brackets onto the body in order to hold the car together during reassembly.

The best part? They did it in six hours overnight and for the next five months mid-century New Yorkers got to wake up to an American icon smiling down at them.







UPDATE: I asked my contacts at Ford if the automaker would ever do a stunt like this again – maybe next April to celebrate the month the car debuted – and got an enticing answer: "We should never say never."

First Ford Mustang owner still has the keys 49 years after trading a Chevy

The launch of an iconic sports car in today's world often comes with a bidding war to be first in line; witness NASCAR team owner and car dealer Rick Hendrick paying \$1 million last year for the rights to own the first 2014 Chevy Corvette Stingray. But when the Ford Mustang was launched in 1964, Ford went to great lengths to keep the car under wraps as part of its launch. It was just a 22-year-old teacher's good luck that let her become the first Ford Mustang owner — a car that's still in her garage nearly five decades later.

The way Gail Wise tells it, she was just looking for a car to get her to her first job out of college, and was growing tired of her parents' '57 Ford Fairlane, when she went to Johnson Ford in Chicago. After a tour of the showroom turned up



nothing of interest, the salesman said "I've got something in the back that's really new" — a light blue Mustang convertible, fully loaded with a 260 V-8 and a power top.

After some family wheeling-dealing that included the trade-in of a '58 Chevy for \$400, Wise drove the Mustang home on April 15, 1964 — two days before Ford president Lee lacocca would officially unveil the car to a crowd at the World's Fair in New York.

"I just wanted a new car, and was tickled pink to have it," Wise told Yahoo Autos. "I didn't know everyone was waiting for that car." She soon found out just how popular the Mustang was, especially with a young woman behind the wheel; she was often flagged down by curious onlookers: "Everyone was staring at me and waving at me."

Life otherwise went on; Gail married Tom Wise in 1966, the couple raised four children, but held onto the Mustang, which later became Tom's daily driver. Chicago winters burned some rust through the fenders; mechanical problems added up and eventually the Wises parked the Mustang, with Tom Wise expecting to tackle the repairs at some point, just as soon as he found the time.

That was 1979. The Mustang would sit for the next 27 years.

"I was always under the impression I would use it as a retirement project," said Tom Wise.

"He built an addition onto the two-car garage so we could keep the Mustang in there," said Gail Wise.

It wasn't until their children were grown and retirement was close in hand, around 2006, that Tom Wise oversaw the Mustang's restoration. Sheltered neglect meant most of time's damage was limited to the body panels; the engine and interior needed relatively minor work. All of which still took four years.

But the project took on a new urgency when Tom Wise heard another Chicago resident claim to have bought the very first Mustang sold to the public, with a bill of sale from April 16, 1964.

"We dug up the old papers, and I found the one with April 15th on it," Wise told Yahoo. "We drove up there and showed it to him, and he kind of did a double take."

After further consulting with Ford and Mustang owner groups, the Wises' convertible has been deemed the first Mustang sold to the

public. After 49 years of ownership and just 68,000 miles, Gail and Tom Wise have no plans to part with it, and while it's not driven much, they're not keeping it under glass — giving rides to their grandchildren, or letting strangers get close at car shows.

"We'll have to sit down one day and get input from the kids and get an up to date appraisal," Tom Wise said. "If I was really concerned about the car, I'd never take it out of the garage.

Helpful Safety Tips

It is amazing how easy it is for bad guys to dupe the unwary, and anyone can fall for these:

NOT ALL THIEVES ARE STUPID

- 1. LONG-TERM PARKING: Some people left their car in the long-term parking at San Jose while away, and someone broke into the car. Using the information on the car's registration in the glove compartment, they drove the car to the people's home in Pebble Beach and robbed it. So I guess if we are going to leave the car in long-term parking, we should NOT leave the registration/insurance cards in it, nor your remote garage door opener. This gives us something to think about with all our new electronic technology.
- 2. GPS: Someone had their car broken into while they were at a football game. Their car was parked on the green which was adjacent to the football stadium and specially allotted to football fans. Things stolen from the car included a garage door remote control, some money and a GPS which had been prominently mounted on the dashboard. When the victims got home, they found that their house had been ransacked and just about everything worth anything had been stolen. The thieves had used the GPS to guide them to the house. They then used the garage remote control to open the garage door and gain entry to the house. The thieves knew the owners were at the football game, they knew what time the game was scheduled to finish and so they knew how much time they had to clean out the house. It would appear that they had brought a truck to empty the house of its contents.

Something to consider if you have a GPS - don't put your home address in it... Put a nearby address (like a store or gas station) so you can still find your way home if you need to, but no one else would know where you live if your GPS were stolen.

3. CELL PHONES: I never thought of this......This lady has now changed her habit of how she lists her names on her cell phone after her handbag was stolen. Her handbag, which contained her cell phone, credit card, wallet, etc., was stolen. Twenty minutes later when she called her hubby, from a pay phone telling him what had happened, hubby says, "I received your text asking about our Pin number and I've replied a little while ago." When they rushed down to the bank, the bank staff told them all the money was already withdrawn. The thief had actually used the stolen cell phone to text "hubby" in the contact list and got hold of the pin number. Within 20 minutes he had withdrawn all the money from their bank account.

Moral of the lesson:

- a. Do not disclose the relationship between you and the people in your contact list. Avoid using names like Home, Honey, Hubby, Sweetheart, Dad, Mom, etc....
- b. And very importantly, when sensitive info is being asked through texts, CONFIRM by calling back.
- c. Also, when you're being texted by friends or family to meet them somewhere, be sure to call back to confirm that the message came from them. If you don't reach them, be very careful about going places to meet "family and friends" who text you.
- 4. PURSE IN THE GROCERY CART SCAM: A lady went grocery-shopping at a local mall and left her purse sitting in the children's seat of the cart while she reached something off a shelf... wait till you read the WHOLE story! Her wallet was stolen, and she reported it to the store personnel. After returning home, she received a phone call from the Mall Security to say that they had her wallet and that although there was no money in it, it did still hold her personal papers. She immediately went to pick up her wallet, only to be told by Mall Security that they had not called her. By the time she returned home again, her house had been broken into and burglarized. The thieves knew that by calling and saying they were Mall Security, they could lure her out of her house long enough for them to burglarize it.
